Paris Agreement is legally binding

Well below 2°C, and even to 1.5°C

And net zero emissions in the 2nd half of this century

A ratchet mechanism has been agreed, requiring a country to submit its higher NDC every 5 years, beginning in 2020

And also the global stocktake, every 5 years, beginning in 2023, preceeded by a facilitative dialogue in 2018

There is also a mechanism to strengthen mobilization of climate finance over time

Surviving the Storm

VANUATU A woman and her child stand next to an uprooted tree near their home in Port Vila, the capital of the Pacific island nation, on March 16. A powerful cyclone with winds of more than 185 m.p.h. (297 km/h) struck the archipelago three days earlier, destroying or damaging up to 90% of buildings in some areas and killing at least 11 people.
