# Mineral Sand Mining - Australia







- there is a <u>lack of understanding in the wider</u> <u>community about the minerals industry</u> and its contribution to economic and social development in the Pacific region.
- the industry has done much in recent years to improve its environmental and social performance.
- steps need to be taken by PECC and other bodies to document and promote, in a balanced way, these achievements.



- Small countries in the region, such as East Timor and Solomon Islands, face significant challenges in ensuring that minerals resource development takes place in a sustainable way.
  - eg designing appropriate legal and regulatory frameworks,
  - strengthening the skills and resources of regulatory agencies,
  - enhancing the <u>capacity of governments and communities</u> to negotiate with resource developers, and
  - ensuring that the <u>wealth generated</u> by minerals resource developments is managed appropriately.



 Community support and acceptance of mining is a precondition for successful projects. Companies must be genuinely committed from the outset of projects to engaging constructively with local communities and contributing to their long term social and economic development.



• The wealth generated by mining projects must be managed so that the <u>benefits are distributed</u> equitably. Failure to do this will exacerbate tensions within societies and jeopardise community support for future projects.



- Representatives of nongovernment organisations (NGOs), should be actively encouraged to participate in future PECC meetings
- However, it is recognised that some NGOs are not interested in engaging with the mining industry







- Small mining companies, particularly those that are new to the Asia-Pacific region, often do not have the capacity to effectively manage social and environmental issues.
- Larger, more experienced, companies should be encouraged to share their expertise with smaller companies.



- A <u>regional</u>, as opposed to country-specific, approach should be taken to providing tertiary education and training for industry personnel.
- There should also be more opportunities provided for mining industry professionals and regulators from less-developed countries to work in the Australian industry and expand their skills and experience.



## Recommendations

- PECC should initiate a project focused on building the capacity of small countries in the region to manage mineral resource developments in accordance with sustainable development principles.
- The methodology that is developed for this purpose could then serve as a prototype for similar exercises with other countries.



## Recommendations

- PECC should seek to develop closer links with <u>key</u> industry associations, such as the Minerals Council of Australia and the International Council for Mines and Metals.
- Meeting outcomes should be communicated to these organisations and they should be invited to attend future meetings of the Network.



## Recommendations

- The next meeting of the Minerals Network should maintain the focus on the environmental and, particularly, the community aspects of minerals resource development.
- The emphasis should be on sharing information about effective strategies for addressing these issues, rather than just on identifying problems.
  - For example, there needs to be a greater focus on the 'how to' of community development
  - In addition, the meeting should explore practical ways of assisting smaller companies operating in the region to improve their social and environmental performance.
