- Previously proposed but not currently under active development (as PTAs) (9)
 - AFTA-CER
 - Japan-Canada
 - P5 (US, Australia, Singapore, Chile, New Zealand)
 - US-New Zealand
 - Japan-Chile
 - Korea-US
 - Korea-New Zealand
 - Hong Kong-New Zealand
 - Chinese Taipei-New Zealand

Possible Classifications

- Bilateral (BTA)
 - most numerous type, different classifications possible
 - intra-East Asia (e.g Japan-Singapore)
 - intra-Western Pacific (e.g. Singapore-NZ)
 - trans-Pacific (e.g. Singapore-Chile)
 - "large" "small" linkages (BTAs involving US, Japan, Korea with "small" partners)
 - "small" "small" linkages (e.g. Singapore-NZ)
 - "large" "large" linkages (e.g. Japan-Korea)

- plurilateral
 - amalgamations of existing groups (e.g. ASEAN-CER) or existing bilaterals (e.g. Singapore-Chile-NZ)

- "mega-blocs"
 - "ASEAN Plus three" (East Asian Bloc)
 - FTAA

- "hubs" and "spokes"
 - "primary" hubs:
 - US
 - China
 - Japan
 - ASEAN (ASEAN Plus One model)
 - "secondary" hubs
 - Singapore
 - Chile
 - Mexico

Forseeable Outcomes

• "kaleidoscope" of overlapping/intersecting bilaterals and plurilaterals

• "bipolar Pacific" based on megablocs in East Asia (ASEAN Plus Three) and Americas (FTAA) • "hub and spoke" arrangements based on large regional "hubs" (US, China, Japan, Korea)

ASEAN as a possible alternative "hub"

perhaps combined with the "kaleidoscope" of BTAs

• achievement of the APEC "vision" of free trade and investment in the Asia-Pacific region?

Competing models?

- Evidence of distinct "models"
 - "NAFTA model" (with Canadian variations)
 - -"AFTA model"
 - "CER model"
 - -"EU model"
 - "Indian model" (or "ALADI model")

- Rules of origin
- Trade remedies

Services Trade:

• NAFTA v. GATS approach

Trade and Investment Facilitation

- Standards and conformance
- Customs
- Quarantine
- Investment
- Government Procurement

"Additional" Elements

- Intellectual property
- Competition policy
- E-Commerce
- Trade and Environment
- Trade and Labour
- Capital movements

- Pressure for smaller economies to follow the "models" of the major 'hubs'
 - → multiple PTAs may imply many "models" for a single economy

• Potential clashes of "models" in negotiations for new PTAs
